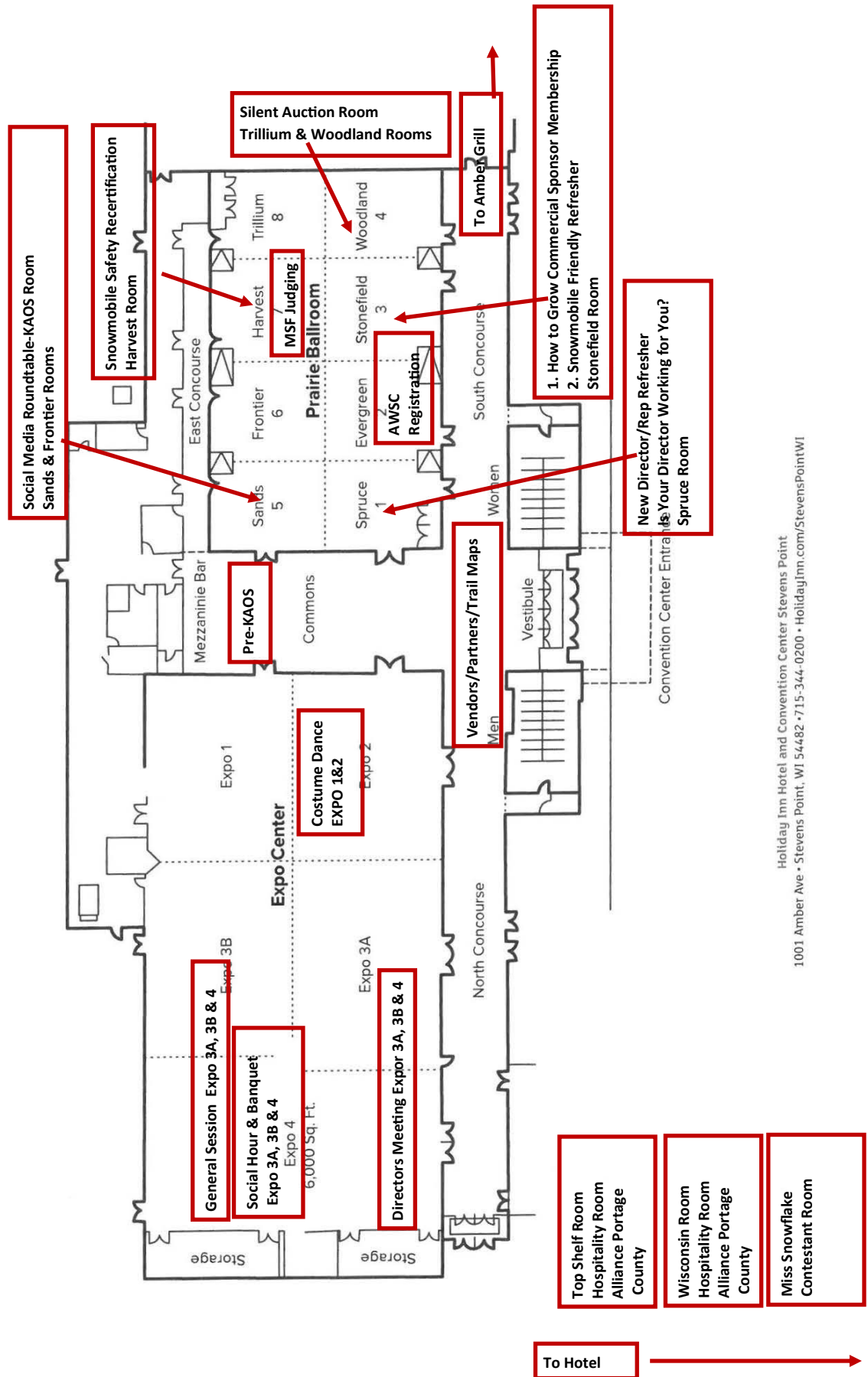

2025 AWSC Of The Year Awards

The AWSC Of The Year Awards are applications taken from members, either nominating a person, club or dealer. To be given this award, you must demonstrate your involvement and commitment to snowmobiling. These awards are judged by a committee of directors and reps. Once selected they will be forwarded onto ACSA for inclusion in the ACSA Of The Year Award. AWSC commends you on your participation and involvement in snowmobiling in the state of Wisconsin.

Perry Heiser—AWSC 2025 Snowmobiler Of The Year

Perry has been an avid snowmobiler since the early 1970's when his father purchased their first snowmobiles for their family to enjoy. At that time, his family were members of the WISM Riders, which has since merged with another Waunakee Club to form the Waunakee Winter Wanderers. He has been a member of an AWSC Club for over 50 years!

For many decades, Perry has worked in a wide variety of leadership positions in our Club. For the past five years, Perry has served as our club's official "Trail Boss." Perry coordinates 90% of our operational efforts by coordinating closely with other club members, leaders, and volunteers to ensure all our trails are properly signed and inspected before the snow flies. Perry is our lead groomer who schedules, trains, and monitors the Club's groomer operators.

Perry's persistent attendance, testimony, and professional messaging at numerous public meetings had a direct impact on the DOT over a 2-year period - to effectively articulate to the DOT and Dane County Reps how a simple construction adjustment on a new bridge design for a 10' wide "non-travel lane" would ensure the trail not only survived, but would also improve safety by providing a safe space for the Groomer/Drag modifying their bridge plan. Perry's 2-year effort effectively saved this Club trail for snowmobilers and improved safety for our Groomer operators for decades to come. He also recruited and coordinated other snowmobilers to attend and testify at these meetings. His efforts on saving and improving safety of a short, Club snowmobile trail the DOT and Dane County deemed unworthy of saving were nothing short of Superb! Perry is one of those behind the scenes people, that truly does not like to be recognized.

Tanner Clark—AWSC 2025 Young Snowmobiler Of The Year

Tanner's personal commitment and passion for the sport of organized snowmobiling has deepened with each year. Growing up as an active member of Oregon Sno Blazers, Tanner embraces the determination, dedication and hard work required to maintain clubs and trail systems with his active participation in meetings, events, fundraising, trail cleanup, signage bridge building. Tanner is a multiple club member committed to representing all individuals within organized snowmobiling. He demonstrates understanding of the importance of strong community and landowner relationships, annual fundraising, charitable giving and volunteerism both independently and on behalf of his clubs. Annually, Tanner continues to dedicate countless hours in the areas of landowner appreciation picnics, snowmobile safety education, Brooklyn Sno-Hornets and Oregon Sno-Blazers Labor Day Truck/Tractor Pull, Easter Seals Blizzard Blast, Sno Blazers Scavenger Hunt, Oregon Food Pantry, Angel's Wish, Dane County Humane Society, Salvation Army, Beacon Homeless Shelter, Oregon School District, Fire and EMS Districts, and local FFA chapter.

Tanner is a member of AWSC, Dane County Council of Snowmobile Clubs, KAOS, Oregon Sno Blazers and Mercer Area Sno Goers. Tanner honorably served as Vice President of the Dane County Council of Snowmobile Clubs with maturity beyond his years. This year while away at school (UW Platteville) Tanner managed to have the time to help put in a reroute of a trail that they had to move for the Oregon Sno-Blazers, participated in the Clean Snowmobile Challenge (February 2025) and attended International Snowmobile Congress in Prince Edward Island, Canada. Tanner keeps a keen eye on legislation related to organized snowmobiling, as well as participating in opportunities to protect the future of the sport, such as those related to Blue Mounds State Park snowmobile trail access. Within the Oregon Sno Blazers, Tanner serves as board member and youth representative. He has also held the position of club reporter.

In his ongoing quest to encourage youth participation in organized snowmobiling and as an investment in betterment of the sport as a whole, Tanner found himself at home as a member of the KAOS club, first serving as Dane County KAOS Representative, then adding KAOS Vice President and Tanner is now the KAOS President and KAOS Dane County Advisor. Tanner rounds out his commitment to the snowmobile community as a State of Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources snowmobile safety instructor. He has developed engaging lesson plans focused on youth opportunities, club involvement, ride preparedness and sobriety.

Burzinski Family —AWSC 2025 Snowmobile Family Of The Year

The Burzinski are a fun family of 4+. They have been active in organized snowmobiling for 26+ years. Lesia & Rodney much longer, as each are from snowmobile families! Lynsey and Rachyl have both snowmobiled their entire lives. They are all active members of the Orfordville Country Riders but are also involved with numerous clubs.

The Burzinski's represent snowmobiling at club, regional and national activities in so many ways. Starting with their volunteering contributions at the club level! From trail maintenance, landowner appreciation to fundraising, the Burzinski's are quick to engage and make the event fun. They promote snowmobile safety and KAOS at their local snowmobile safety classes, recruiting youth and young riders. Also, at a club level their family assisted with membership recruitment to ensure a neighboring club that was in danger of folding remained active and supported. They have organized and hosted a "bring a friend snowmobiling" ride introducing, promoting and safely showcasing the sport of snowmobiling.

From a state level- each of the Burzinski girls have represented the AWSC as Miss Snowflake. They have held leadership positions in KAOS and now are co-founders of the Next Gen Riders. Rodney, Rachyl and Lynsey have all at one time or another presented at AWSC workshop and conventions. Lynsey was appointed by the Wisconsin Governor Evers to the Snowmobile Recreation Council. She also works in the tourism industry in the northern part of our state, promoting our sport as much as possible. Rachyl was selected as the AWSC and ACSA "Young Snowmobiler of the Year" in 2021. She is currently the editor of the Wisconsin Snowmobile News magazine- using her years of experience in KAOS and knowledge of the sport as a platform to represent! Rodney has been a County Rep and now is the Director of Rock County. Rodney and Lesia have also both been active volunteers for the KAOS program.

From a national level- they have attended ISC for the past 8 years with the KAOS program, representing, promoting and showcasing the AWSC's youth involvement.

Tim Bier—AWSC 2025 Volunteer Groomer Of The Year

Tim is a dedicated member and has a passion for snowmobiling, doing everything he can to make sure the trails are as good as they can possibly be. Last year he spent months and countless hours researching rollers for our trail system and found the best way to construct one himself. He drew up his own set of plans and ordered the steel and parts he needed to build one. He had to search for tires big enough to fit the roller and would make the best for packing trails. He spent 68+ hours of cutting steel, painting, welding, wiring, and putting it all together with help from only a few other members. When he was finished he has a 110inch wide roller, 25ft long, with clearance and strobe lights, and 33 inch tires. He poured his heart into making that roller happen. When he finally took it out on the trails I saw him almost in tears of happiness at the success of something he put endless hours into. When he rolled for the first time he immediately notices a huge difference with how compact and smooth the trails were. The club is very pleased with the roller and members at the county level were all very intrigued by it. He had numerous clubs reaching out to him about the specs and details of our new piece of equipment interested in having Tim build one for them or building one their selves.

Snowmobiling is in Tim's blood. Year round he spends hours on groomer maintenance, and about 4 hours a week year round maintaining the shed, property, and other operations. When he isn't grooming, he enjoys getting some throttle time on the trails snowmobiling on the local trails as well as up north!

He is also active in the Green Lake Terrace Sno Streakers. He attends all of their meetings, as well as the Sno Drifters, the county alliance, and other clubs within our county. It's safe to say our club would be lost without Tim and his hard work, dedication, and knowledge. I couldn't think of anyone who would be more deserving and honored to receive this award than Tim.

Brodie Erickson—AWSC 2025 Young Volunteer Groomer Of The Year

Brodie's grooming responsibilities are extensive and vital to maintaining a high-quality and safe trail system. To start, he regularly operates a variety of the White Thunder Riders club's equipment, including one of the three Tucker Sno-Cats, either of the two New Holland tractors, and the John Deere Gator side-by-side. In addition, he is highly skilled in using and coupling all grooming attachments such as drags, rollers, booms, flail and sickle bar mowers, and any tools related to grading and blading the trails. Even more, when it comes to maintenance, Brodie is typically one of the first to show up, making sure every grease zerk is taken care of and helping with whatever else needs to be done.

Brodie's willingness to volunteer for grooming, particularly as a young adult, is especially valuable, as well-maintained trails are critical for rider safety and enjoyment. What makes his involvement even more special is that he's proudly carrying the torch passed down from his dad and grandpa, continuing a family tradition of service and dedication to snowmobiling and the community. With the average membership age of an AWSC member being 50+, dedicated younger volunteers like Brodie are the reason our club can continue to provide and sustain the high-quality trail system that snowmobilers rely on year after year. Overall, his dedication, friendly personality, and hands-on approach play a key role in keeping club operations running smoothly and Iron County trails in top condition.

Beyond grooming equipment maintenance and operation, Brodie actively participates in a wide range of snowmobiling-related activities that benefit both the club and the community. For example, he's always ready to help with trail signage installation, making sure trails are clearly marked and safe for riders. Equally important, one of his favorite roles is training adult volunteers on the proper use of grooming equipment, where he generously shares both his knowledge and passion for the sport.

Currently, Brodie is also involved in Iron County's Snowmobile Safety Program, helping to teach youth safe riding practices as they work toward earning their snowmobile safety permits. His efforts in this area play a vital role in building a strong, safety-minded generation of future snowmobilers.

Antigo Sno-Drifters—AWSC 2025 Club Of The Year

Antigo Sno-Drifters has always taken a soft approach to pushing membership, but has always excelled in dedication, honesty, experience, and at times has almost felt like the "big brother" because of our leadership. Although membership has stayed consistent the past 10 years, the dedication and teamwork has been fine crafted because of our centralized volunteers and sponsors. The Sno-Drifters recently started recognizing the path they've forged at Making Trails Generational, and the story was told at the 2024 Fall Workshop, Family of the Year Awards Ceremony. Drew Grall sifted through the Antigo Sno-Drifters archives and was astonished when he learned of his grand-parents being one of the founding members of the club, and active on the entertainment board. Fast forward to 2025, and you'll now see the Grall Family celebrating four generations of dedication to the Antigo Sno-Drifters. From an outside approach, we believe the core group brings a family feel to new members and are drivers of setting members up for success when it comes to duties. We have lost a few members due to the last two bad snowmobile seasons; however, we have gained a few new great members due to staying positive and promoting the club on Facebook.

Ironically, the past two bad snowmobile seasons have been record setting for Antigo Sno-Drifter's Facebook membership! At our September 2024 meeting, Vice President Drew Grall advised members on current Facebook follower counts. Consistency and quality-content were all factors in growing new Facebook membership count from 4,200 to 5,600 last season alone. With a thirteen-day snowmobile season, and a 33% record organic growth, we knew we were doing something right. Drew also documented a twenty-eight-day snapshot of Facebook traffic where we experienced just short of 1.1 million views! This speaks volume to the positive impact a non-profit snowmobile club, in a town of 8,000 people, can have on snowmobilers and non-snowmobilers alike.

Antigo Sno-Drifters proudly hosts Antigo as a favorite stop with 99 miles of trails, IN THE COUNTY OF TRAILS, with big timber, rolling hills, fast flats, and cedar swamps. Antigo Sno-Drifters operates state-of-the-art John Deere tractors suited with Soucy Tracks and iconic blue Trailsetter Drags. This past snowmobile season we had ten people grooming and in a normal snowmobile season we generally have up to fifteen people grooming.

HEXCO Motorsports — AWSC 2025 Dealer Of The Year

HEXCO is an active member with the Drifters Snowmobile Club, Inc in Neenah, WI. The Probst Family (owners) and employees have been active in organized snowmobiling for over 20 years. HEXCO Motorsports itself has been active with organized snowmobiling since it opened 7 ½ years ago.

The Jeremy Probst family has been snowmobiling since the early 90's and his family since the early 2000's. They actively promote youth snowmobiling and their children have been riding on private property since age 3. They purchased the dealership for the love of snowmobiling in late 2017. Hexco Motorsports is active in Drifters Snowmobile Club in Neenah, WI. Jeremy Probst participates on the Board of Directors and is active in fundraising, grooming, groomer maintenance. Hexco Motorsports also lends demo units to many other Winnebago County Clubs to help with trail maintenance and signage. The ownership maintains trails, operates, and repairs the groomers and has helped other clubs in the state promote trails and snowmobiling. They are a large sponsor of the Plymouth Snow Rangers and were vendors at 2025 Hay Days and Wide Open Wisconsin.

Hexco Motorsports regularly promotes clubs from all over Winnebago county and afar on their Facebook Page. In the winter and many other months, they have over 10K followers many of which are snowmobile fans. Creative content promoting the sport is shared with all of their followers.
